Removing this act of violence and the battle makes the story more children-friendly and happy. The original story also adds that if nobody will marry the princess in Spain she will go to where there is no light, so that nobody could see her beauty. I took this out and just made it that she would leave Spain to make it more realistic. I also added many details of the castle to make it more like a fairy tale.
